Scrooge: Who are you?

Scrooge: **(impatiently)** Alright. Who were you then?

Marley: I was Jacob Marley. I've been gone 7 years now.

Scrooge: Humbug! I don't believe it. You are a bad case of indigestion: some bad dream brought on by some rich, saucy food.

(Marley screams eerily and shakes his chains at Scrooge, causing him to fall back against his chair, shaking with fear.)

Scrooge: Mercy! Why are you bothering me?

(Marley stops and sits down in the armchair opposite Scrooge.)


